BREAKFAST AREA

KITCHEN

'The cabinets are made from liquid metal, which is quite a new product - the carpenter came up with the idea,' says Pieter. 'It's like a brass colour and when you paint it on it's very shiny, but you buff it to create the pattern and level of shine you want. We wanted it to look like aged brass, complementing the mirror above the sink.'

hen a rarely available plot of land came up for sale in their home village in The Netherlands, design duo Michelle Jager van't Hof and Pieter Jager couldn't resist snapping it up in order to build their dream family home. 'We were living a stone's throw away in a small neighbourhood filled with homes from the 1920s and 1930s,' says Michelle. 'Despite the paint being barely dry in our previous home, we didn't hesitate for a second and decided to seize the opportunity.'

Designing a new build with three small kids in tow is no mean feat, but the couple has managed to create something they hope will stand the test of time and be enjoyed now and well into the future. 'We designed this house with the aim for it to fit seamlessly within the neighbourhood's aesthetic, while incorporating our own modern touches, hence the thatched roof that will age quickly, the white limewashed walls and the scorched timber on the facade,' explains Pieter. 'But we certainly did not want to recreate a 1920s/1930s house. Instead we wanted to merge the style of that era with modern touches, like the contemporary vertical window at the front, all in a thoughtfully balanced way.'

Despite the challenges that come with building a new home, the upside is the luxury of being able to decide exactly how you want to live and breathe in your own space, and for Michelle and Pieter that was in creating open-plan living that could also be easily closed off. 'Architecture and interiors are closely intertwined. You get the best results when you are involved from the start of construction,' says Michelle. 'We wanted an open home where different areas are interconnected yet stand alone. By having separate spaces, it becomes easier to incorporate various colours and styles. And by repeating those specific colours and shapes, we ensure there's a connection between the different areas.'

There's certainly no shortage of colour and pattern in this exciting home: from punchy purple, burnt amber and pale yellow hues to fun curves, squiggles and arches, each colour and shape evokes a different atmosphere and feeling, whether that's the calm, earthy pink bedroom or the cosy, deep pink/red dining room. The blend of materials such as rich woods, coloured natural stones, glossy surfaces and plush fabrics represents a balanced combination of diverse styles, enriched with vintage pieces and well-considered art. 'Our design process always begins with establishing the desired ambience, after which the layout, materials and colours naturally follow,' says Pieter. 'Then it's about incorporating lots of personal stuff. We love to collect vintage art and furniture from our travels, so we have lots of unique pieces that tell a story. Your home is your most important, sacred place, so you want it to feel personal.'



ENTRANCE HALL

'It took a while to find the perfect yellow! We tried 10 different shades and in the end a local Dutch brand won.'
